No warnings, no advanced notice. This was never more evident when we went into lockdown again at the start of the year. We were fully ready for reopening, starting with mass testing and the day before we were told to teach remotely again.

Schools have played an integral part through the pandemic, sharing information, conducting mass testing, tracking and tracing close contacts. I hope you feel we have done the best by our school community - we have certainly given it our very best shot.

Mastering online learning and Teams, developing high levels of independence and stickability that will see them achieve great things in the future. I applaud each and every one of you.

I had hoped to be completely free of Coronavirus restrictions for September 2021 but sadly it will not have gone

away. We will be starting the year again with mass testing in school (two tests per student) and then home testing for the remainder of September.

The restrictions on bubbles will be lifted, as will the need for close contacts to isolate, replaced with a

testing programme. We will be keeping some of our control measures, such as staggered breaks and lunches, one-way systems and different entrance/exit points at the start and end of the day.

We will be doing all we can to move forward and return our school to the hive of opportunities it has been in the past. A resumption of all our clubs and to get our students out on the many trips we run to enrich their experience at Charlton. I will write separately to this to inform you of the arrangements for the start of term.

As is the way in the summer term we have a few colleagues we need to say goodbye to. Firstly Mrs Serrell-Cooke, one of my highly valued senior team. She has made the decision to retire, I am grateful to her for her tireless hard work over the last 5 years I have been in the school and wish her a very happy and healthy retirement.

Young Person Grant Scheme

Please find below a letter from Cllr Shaun Davies and Cllr Shirley Reynolds regarding the launch of the Leader and Cabinet Members' Young Person Grant Scheme, which awards eligible 15-25 year olds up to £500 of financial support to help our young people back into Education, Employment, and Training.

Monday 21st June marks the launch date for this year's Leader and Cabinet Members' Young Person Grant Scheme. In previous years, funding has been allocated for children and young people who requested grant assistance to support them to progress in a sport, in their work in the performing arts, or in accessing education, training, and employment, and we have already assisted 168 of our young people across the borough.

In the years 2017-18, and 2018-19, we have been able to provide £23,675 to young people to help them excel in their sport of choice, providing equipment, travel to tournaments, and training. £11,328 has been awarded to our young people with a passion for the performing arts and culture, helping to pay for costumes, classes, specialist footwear, and art equipment. £6,884.70 has been provided to our young people to help them into education, employment, and training, investing in travel assistance, personal protective equipment such as safety footwear, and entry to courses not otherwise funded through bursary schemes.

This year, we are hoping to assist more young people than ever, by opening out our criteria to include any 15-25 year olds who require some funding to commence in or return to education, training, or employment. This may include travel assistance, equipment, course funding, and even enterprise funding to help sustain start-ups and businesses with our young people at the helm. The panel are particularly keen to receive applications from our young people in care and care leavers, and would like to hear from our young people who are so passionate about forging their path into education, employment, and training, but need some extra

support to do so. This extra support will be key in our bounceback from the impacts and challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are looking to support at least one young person from each ward, so please do promote this scheme across your communities. Young people can apply online on this website, https://www.telford.gov.uk/ info/20397/

LOCKDOWN ROUND-UP

At Charlton, our vision is to nurture happy, healthy young people who have the knowledge, academic achievement and strength of character to lead safe and successful lives in modern Britain, preparing them for their next steps in education or employment with a thirst for lifelong learning. As we made the move back into face-toface teaching for all students our priority was to ensure our students were happy and healthy, were in the right frame of mind to progress and achieve academically and support them to process their lockdown experiences as they continued to build character traits that will prepare them for adulthood.

Planning for a full return was focussed around supporting the wellbeing and mental health of students and ensuring they had everything they needed to make a successful transition back to school. We also planned support for physical resources such as laptops, stationery and uniform. We worked closely with the Learning Communities Trust to support families who needed help financially; linking with community food bank initiatives; and setting up our own uniform 'swap shop' to reduce the cost of back to school uniform, to ensure all students had the uniform they needed.

On return to school students took part in our 'recovery curriculum' which identified gaps in their learning and to support students to feel confident in their next steps. Work in form times was centred around processing experiences from lockdown and planning for the future, enabling students to feel positive about what the future holds for them post-covid.

STEM NEWS

2020/21 has been an exciting year for STEM at Charlton.

June 28th saw Charlton's first STEM Day. Students, whilst following their normal timetable, received STEM based lessons from their teachers. Activities included geological timelines, light and periscopes, famous Scientists, limits of vision and orienteering. Students were able to see how STEM is linked to all subjects in a variety of different ways. Following positive feedback from the students, we will be running the day again next year.

Earlier in the year, we ran a STEM Innovations competition where students were asked to design an innovative product for the future. Massive congratulations to Eliza-Mae in Year 7 who won the competition with her shower-dry design – an environmentally friendly, time saving device that would be a benefit in any household!

We have appointed a fantastic group of STEM Leaders who will be leading activities for the 2021/22 year. The students attended a STEM Leaders workshop alongside students from Ercall Wood which helped them to develop leadership skills and gave them some opportunities to see different activities that they can use with younger students. Students were also asked to think about their vision of STEM in school and to consider how they can actively engage the younger years within the school.

Year 10 Business students have taken part in a workshop where they had to provide suggestions/ solutions to a prevent the closure of an engineering company. Students were given a success criterion which





included innovation, justifying recommendations and producing high quality presentations. Some fantastic suggestions were given with the challenge being won by Lois, Lewis, Josh and Emily. The second challenge was based around Lean manufacturing, producing solutions that not only eliminate waste but also sustainably deliver value to the customer. For this challenge, students had to consider the cost for parts, time to manufacture and the costs for labour. A difficult challenge but ultimately won by Alfie, Mayo, Demi-leigh and Michael. Congratulations to the winners.

Next year, there will be lots of opportunities for students to explore STEM with competitions, clubs and inter-Trust activities including the restarting our STEM clubs. There are two STEM clubs – a LEGO club run by the Design and Technology department, and a STEM club run by the Science, Maths and Art departments. We will be announcing dates and times at the start of the Autumn term. Watch this space!!

MCMT STEM Activity

A group of Y10 students with an interest in a career in Engineering took part in an MCMT (Marches Centre of Manufacturing & Technology) STEM activity recently. Ever-changing situation for schools is 'relentless'

With a 22-year career in education Andy McNaughton says he could never have imagined being at the helm of a secondary school as it is today.

This week he opened a Covid lateral flow testing centre at the Charlton School in Wellington, Telford, overseeing self testing for firstly staff and, later this week, pupils who are in school.

Lessons are being taught online and Mr McNaughton has been ensuring families in need can borrow laptops or have additional phone data to allow children to take part.

It is a far cry from either his early career as a PE teacher or even the start of his headship just 12 months ago.

"I never imagined myself and my staff would now be running a lateral flow testing centre," he said.

Mr McNaughton added that the move to the post-Christmas lockdown took everyone by surprise.

"People don't appreciate that we learn about the changes at exactly the same as everyone else, watching the announcement as they are made – we have no prior warning.

"We had been expecting a staggered return to lessons but, after the prime minister's television appearance on the Monday night, we had to start contacting all the parents and finding out how many key worker and vulnerable children would be in school. Primary school heads had an even worse situation, which some having had children in that day," he said.

"Working together as our Learning Community Trust is invaluable, everyone is pulling together.

"The help from the trust is vital, I feel very sorry for stand-alone academies."

During the first lockdown which began in March Charlton had only about 20 pupils in school. Today that number is 100. "That is about 10 per cent of our pupils," he said.

The changes for education continue with secondary schools now having to grapple with the cancellation of exams this year.

"Again we had no prior warning. The Year 11s worked tirelessly through the last lockdown thinking they would be sitting their exams. Now they have been cancelled again," Mr McNaughton said.

"What is so frustrating is that there is no plan.

"If the government had announced there will not no exams but this or that would happen instead that would be one thing.

"But with nothing in place instead of exams we now have to work with the students to reassure them.

"The work for everyone in education, for all the staff, is relentless."

Sarah Davies, House Activities Lead at Charlton said March 29-April 4 was National Autism week and this year the charity was focusing on a Super 7 challenge.

The condition can make certain life situations a challenge for these individuals and one of these is school life, where individuals with autism must overcome many daily challenges.

"For the next seven weeks we are challenging all students, staff, parents, and carers to actively participate in our Super 7 Challenge, a challenge to suit everyone.

Students can choose which challenges they want to succeed at and help to raise awareness of the condition of Autism whether taking 70,000 steps, researching the seven wonders of the world and making a model of one, or writing a seven word a day short story.

During Autism week pupils will be show a series of films providing an insight into the challenges individuals with autism have to overcome, to be accepted, understood, and supported by their community.

"Also, we want to inform our students of the barriers which an individual who has autism, has to overcome, in order to allow them to achieve. As their peers, they can support with this."

As part of the Happy Heads campaign designed to see how children are coping during the pandemic, the children were asked to document what was making them happy, what was driving them mad and whether they were getting enough social time. The audio diaries were designed to document young people and their different experiences of lockdown, sharing little snippets of their life.

Student Maya Griffiths from Year 10 said: "It was a great break from the repetitive, tedious routine of lockdown life, as well as that it helped me to realise the change quarantine has caused, also forcing us to accept our fears for the future.

"It made me realise my ability to sugar-coat and ignore negative aspects of quarantine, and enabled me to accept that life isn't perfect, and it's ok to share and acknowledge the sad and stressful emotions."

Andrew McNaughton, principal, said: "We have a commitment to promoting an environment where students can support not only their own emotional health and wellbeing, but also that of those around them. This is done in many ways across the whole school through PSHE lessons, form times discussions, wellbeing week and pastoral support.

"Students learn that it is good to talk about how they are feeling and how they can respond if someone talks to them about something that they are worried about, we are delighted our students have had the chance to take part in this opportunity with BBC and are proud that they are able to talk so openly about their wellbeing during periods of home learning.

"Who knows what will happen to the students' lockdown diaries. Maybe one day post-Covid they will be discovered and give a valuable insight into the challenges children faced during lockdown."

We will require you as parents/carers to consent to any work we undertake if the young person is under the age of 16.

Who are 'CATE' and what do we do?

- A small team within the local Council
- Committed to identifying and working with young people who are at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation
- We build positive and trusting relationships to increase awareness and reduce the risk of CSE
- Working in partnership with all relevant agencies; Police, Safeguarding, Education, Health Services, Social Services and Voluntary Sector
- Offer one to one support delivering the CATE intervention pack covering 6 themes: 'What is CSE?', 'Healthy Relationships', 'Understanding Grooming', 'Internet Safety', 'Sex and the law', 'Peer pressure'
- Supporting young people to access other services/agencies as appropriate

What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

"Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse in which a child or young person is exploited, coerced and/or manipulated into engaging in some form of sexual activity in return for something they need or desire and/or for the gain of a third person.

The 'something' received by the child can include both tangible items such as food, somewhere to stay, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or money and more intangible 'rewards' such as perceived affection, protection or a sense of belonging. Fear of what might happen if they do not comply can also be a significant influencing factor.

Common to all these scenarios is an imbalance of power in favour of the abuser and some degree of coercion, intimidation, exploitation, violence and/or enticement of the child or young person." (DSCF 2009)

The abuse can be perpetrated by groups or individuals, and by adults or peers.
