There is nothing more certain that the pandemic continues to add additional stresses and pressures to all our lives.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank all my colleagues for the tremendous commitment they have shown through what has been the most demanding of terms. Hour after

Sadly, in the environment we are in with over 1,300 people in the building, coronavirus cases are inevitable. Unfortunately, at times this term we have seen many cases, some staff who have contracted the virus have been very poorly, including being

hospitalised and requiring extended time off school. I am glad to say the worst affected are on the mend and back with us now in school. Although we have seen lower numbers of cases since half-term, cases have again started to rise these last 10 days.

Despite the challenges the pandemic has thrown at us, students have benefitted from a vast array of clubs, activities, and trips. It was our intention to operate as normally as possible this term, staff have gone above and beyond to provide the

opportunities students have missed over the last two years. I am indebted to them and challenge all students to find a club and take

part. You will find examples of these throughout the newsletter.

When we return in January, we do not yet know what additional measures may be in place or what will be expected of us, other than the need to

again test all students prior to their return to school. Please read my letter sent previously for further details but testing will take place on the following days for each year group:

- Tuesday 4th January Years 7, 8 and 11
- Wednesday 5th January Years 9 and 10

This means the Year groups will return to school on the following days:

- Wednesday 5th January Years 7, 8 and 11
- Thursday 6th January Years 9 and 10

We are working tirelessly in school to identify gaps in students' learning, staff are all delivering afterschool intervention sessions with Year 11. In January we will be employing additional academic mentors, and staff will be leading tutoring sessions for our most disadvantaged students. Our emotional health and wellbeing team continue to work with those students who need that little bit of additional support.

I have been delighted with how the vast majority of our students have coped and are showing great attitudes to their learning, they really are a credit to us and their families and have proved what a resilient group of students we have in school. I look

> forward to seeing the outstanding work they will continue to produce as we move throughout this year and beyond.

It is however heartbreaking to hear of the challenges the pandemic has caused some of our

families, whether that be the loss of loved ones or the financial challenges they face. Within our own community we have many people who are entirely reliant on charities to help them feed their families. I made the decision that instead of sending cards and buying chocolates this year I would buy food to support our own Learning Community Trust Food Hub and Community Fridge, we can all make a difference to those that need it most. There are more details about our Food Hub in the newsletter.

I had hoped more than anything that we wouldn't still be focused on the pandemic as we move towards 2022 but this is not going to be the case. Please continue to follow the rules, support each other, and do everything we can to prevent the spread.

I wish you and your families a very Merry Christmas and please take time, whether you celebrate Christmas or not, to enjoy the things you love doing and to enjoy the company of your loved ones.






We could not feed our community without your support.

To support this initiative and raise awareness of the importance of languages, the MFL department here at Charlton, organised a whole week of language activities for the students to participate in. They proved a great success with students in all year groups getting involved during their language lessons.

Areas in the school were labelled in French and German to highlight school-based vocabulary in both languages studied at Charlton.

The Masked Speaker videos were a great success with students having the opportunity to hear many different members of staff speaking a foreign language. The catch was, they were disguised using some hilarious filters and voices were changed so it proved quite tricky at times. A particular highlight was Mrs Vickers as a German speaking broccoli and Mr McNaughton as a French speaking cupcake.

Year 7s found out about the flags for different countries that were hung up in the MFL corridor. This helped to raise their awareness of other countries.



Year 8s had to research the different languages displayed in classrooms around the school and work out what they were. Lots of students took part in this and worked hard to find out about languages they may not have seen before.

In lessons, students completed the European day of Languages quiz in small teams to discover facts about languages and see how much they knew about countries in Europe and beyond.

To reward those who did well in these different challenges, some students were chosen to attend a celebratory buffet and have some delicious treats! These were thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended and was a lovely end to the European Day of Languages activities.

ANTI-BULLYING AMBASSADORS

In November, twenty Charlton Students took part in the Princess Diana Antibullying ambassador training. The Diana Award Anti-Bullying Campaign engages young people, parents and teachers to change the attitudes, behaviour and culture of bullying by building skills and confidence to address different situations, both online and offline. Sapphire from year 7 took part and has written about her experience:


"At Charlton school we have had a few pupils chosen to be an anti-bullying ambassador for our school. We had a training meeting with somebody from the Princess Diana charity. We talked about bullying and things we could do to try and get the cases of bullying down to lower than they are now. We also did a survey and talked about things we could do to raise money for charity and awareness about bullving and cyber bulling. Since then we have had a meeting about it and we did a survey like the one we did in the training meeting to reflect on what we had learned.

In school we are now ambassadors who can be told about bullying problems and things that are happening to peer members of Charlton. If we do get told about anybody getting bullied we will go to a teacher who we can trust to talk to about it. Then they will then solve the bullying behaviour.

Some of the ideas we got were a rainbow run for LGBTQ2+ members to feel safe in school as a member of it in school. We had ideas about disabled people with hidden or visible disabilities. We had many other ideas as well and we have written them down on an action plan. We will get a badge saying we are ambassadors so others know they can come to us and talk to us about it at any time. We have 20 ambassadors in total, a few for each year group so they can go to somebody they feel safe talking to."

HARVEST FESTIVAL ASSEMBLY




EVENTS

Careers day for students

Employers from across Telford visited Charlton School to talk to students about careers available to them in the local area.



The special Curriculum Enhancement Day gave the year 10 and 11 students the chance to think about work experience and their futures.

Liz Soulby who is Head of Careers at the school in Wellington said: "To support our year 10 students with making their decisions over the work experience placements they would like to pursue we invited a range of employers from the local area to come and give presentations.

"It gave the students a better idea of what is available to them," she said.

"Telford is a growing town, especially in the digital sector, and we wanted the students to learn how the sector is moving quickly and the new opportunities available to them. 


Changemakers is an innovative, free, personal and professional development project, created specifically for students aged 15-18, supporting character education.


"Events and awards such as this are an integral part of the wider school curriculum," Mr McNaughton said.



We will require you as parents/carers to consent to any work we undertake if the young person is under the age of 16.

Who are 'CATE' and what do we do?

- A small team within the local Council
- Committed to identifying and working with young people who are at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation
- We build positive and trusting relationships to increase awareness and reduce the risk of CSE
- Working in partnership with all relevant agencies; Police, Safeguarding, Education, Health Services, Social Services and Voluntary Sector
- Offer one to one support delivering the CATE intervention pack covering 6 themes: 'What is CSE?', 'Healthy Relationships', 'Understanding Grooming', 'Internet Safety', 'Sex and the law', 'Peer pressure'
- Supporting young people to access other services/agencies as appropriate

What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

"Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse in which a child or young person is exploited, coerced and/or manipulated into engaging in some form of sexual activity in return for something they need or desire and/or for the gain of a third person.

The 'something' received by the child can include both tangible items such as food, somewhere to stay, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or money and more intangible 'rewards' such as perceived affection, protection or a sense of belonging. Fear of what might happen if they do not comply can also be a significant influencing factor.


Common to all these scenarios is an imbalance of power in favour of the abuser and some degree of coercion, intimidation, exploitation, violence and/or enticement of the child or young person." (DSCF 2009)

The abuse can be perpetrated by groups or individuals, and by adults or peers.
