Bone Talk (12+) review by Libbylouise Herbert

About this book

The book "Bone Talk" written by



Candy Gourlay and illustrated by Kerby Rosanes, it's set in a Filipino jungle, 100 years ago and is about a boy

called Samkad who is about to become a man for the first time. He is desperate to be given his own shield, spear and axe but his best friend, Luki wants to become a warrior too but she is a girl and that is forbidden. Then one day a new boy arrives in the village with news about people called 'Americans' are bringing war to his home. When the story starts, Samkad is most worried about receiving the Cut (something like circumcision that happens to boys in their tenth year on the cusp of manhood) and his slightly complicated friendship with a girl called Luki. He has never met anyone outside of his tribe before, but everything changes when the Americans invade.

Who is it about?

Samkad is a boy from a remote Filipino "head-hunter" tribe called Bontok in the highlands of the Philippines, back in around 1899. Samkad's story is told so sensitively, so lightly and so truthfully that you are completely transported (heart in mouth) to another time and world - until Samkad's concerns are your concerns and you're with him every step of the way. His best friend is a girl called Luki who dreams of becoming a warrior too one day but sadly she's a girl and it's forbidden for a girl to fight with a shield, spear and axe or any weapons at all.

About the Author

Growing up in the Philippines, Candy Gorlay wondered why all the books she'd ever loved didn't resemble her steamy



tropical home in Manila. As a result, it took her years to fulfil her dream of becoming an author – and years to learn that Filipino stories, too, belong in the pages of books.









About Carnegie

Andrew Carnegie was a Scottish-American industrialist, business magnate, and philanthropist.

Carnegie led the expansion of the American steel industry in the late 19th century and became one of the richest Americans in history. He became a leading philanthropist in the United States and in the British Empire. During the last 18 years of his life, he

gave away about \$350 million (conservatively \$5.15 billion in 2019 dollars) to charities, foundations, and universities – almost 90 percent of his fortune.

Carnegie died on August 11, 1919, in Lenox, Massachusetts at his Shadow Brook estate, of bronchial pneumonia. He had already given away \$350,695,653 (approximately \$76.9 billion, adjusted to 2015 share of GDP figures) of his wealth away. Carnegie died of a disease called "Bronchopneumonia" (a type of lung disease/problem).

The Poet X review by Hollie Betterton

The Poet X written by Elizabeth Acevedo is very interesting, emotional and beautifully written. It's set in the present day and is about Xiomara (see-

oh-mah-ruh). The book is written in poetry as if it's her diary. In the book she is seen as a girl who seems OK at school but at home, not so good...

It starts with her giving a bit

of information about her and her brother Xavier. When she's seated next to a boy called Aman in Science, she can't deny that she is attracted to him.

But her mother has other ideas of Xiomara becoming a nun.

Axiomara also wants to be a poet and starts 'Slam Poetry Club', unleashing her inner voice, from a shy schoolgirl to a young woman poet.

I enjoyed this book; it is for older readers because some words are quite strong and may upset younger readers.

Year 10 A Day For Your Future

On Monday 1st July, the whole year 10 cohort participated in a day to prepare themselves for future interviews both educational and vocational.

All students were presented with a welcome pack which contained important paperwork for the day and goodies.

Throughout the day, the students were able to converse with a range of employers from across Telford whilst participating in various activities:

Interviews

Over 30 employers gave their time to the students to interview them and share their interview knowledge. Each student was observed by their peer and the employer completed a feedback sheet for the students to take home.

NCS Employer Skills Session

The students were given various challenges to participate in whilst considering the skills implemented, such as: leader, problem-solver. A very active session to help the students' team building skills.

Panellists

Five diverse people discussed with the students the journeys which they had taken since leaving Secondary School and offered a Q&A session afterwards.

Post 16

Telford College hosted an interactive session to introduce the students to Post 16. After a brief introduction to Post 16, the students were able to participate in some hand/eye co-ordination activities.









Careers Room

Four additional employers shared the opportunities available to the students for engineering (McPhillips), electronic manufacturing (Schnieder), NHS and DWP. The students heard a short summary of the different sectors, followed by a Q&A session.

The students were amazing throughout the whole day and engaged with each activity as they were presented. Many were nervous and completely out of their comfort zone however they all embraced the challenge; they should all be incredibly proud of themselves.



Telford College Taster Session

Year 10 students attended a taster session at Telford College on Thursday 11th June.

Having already selected two tasters to participate in, the students made their own way to the college ready for that Post 16 experience.

Starting with an informal meet and greet in the sports hall, the students were soon packed off to their first taster. The tasters ranged from Social Sciences A level to Hospitality and Catering Vocational courses.

The first taster sessions were incredibly successful with the students chatting excitedly about what they had been doing. There was a chance for a quick meet up before they got to experience how the restaurant functioned – and the meal deal went down a treat.

Harvey Robinson and Lewis Evans, both 13, are set to walk the Wrekin five times in a day for Charlton School classmate Hope Moorman, 12, who had to have four rounds of brain surgery after collapsing in March.

She suffered subdural empyema, a dangerous condition in which pus gets onto the brain, and has had to learn to walk and talk again.

Thankfully, she is on the mend, and was all smiles last week. That's down in no small part to the lads, who have been there to support her.

Harvey's mum Kerry said: "At first I was worried that I was going to have to prepare him for the worst. We didn't know if she was going to recover.

"He was starting to get quite angry and upset. He couldn't concentrate at school. But luckily, things are looking up. He just wants to do something to help her because he has felt helpless.

"I'm really proud of them both, it's a lovely idea."

She added: "They're just friends from school. They're always playing Xbox and laughing.

"So far they've raised £270.

"Hopefully the money will support her for whatever she needs. It would be nice if it could go towards a holiday for them, it's been a hard time. They're been through an absolute nightmare."

Hope's mum Jeannine said: "Harvey's been amazing, bless him. They are constantly on the phone to each other. Lots of people have been helping out and raising money."

Plan a safe escape

If your smoke alarm went off in the night, would you know what to do?

- Plan an escape route and make sure everyone knows how to escape.
- Make sure all exits are kept clear.
- The best route is the normal way in and out of your home.
- Think of a second route in case the first one is blocked.
- Take a few minutes to practice your escape plan.
- Review your plan if the layout of your home changes.

We will require you as parents/carers to consent to any work we undertake if the young person is under the age of 16.

Who are 'CATE' and what do we do?

- A small team within the local Council
- Committed to identifying and working with young people who are at risk of Child Sexual Exploitation
- We build positive and trusting relationships to increase awareness and reduce the risk of CSE
- Working in partnership with all relevant agencies; Police, Safeguarding, Education, Health Services, Social Services and Voluntary Sector
- Offer one to one support delivering the CATE intervention pack covering 6 themes: 'What is CSE?', 'Healthy Relationships', 'Understanding Grooming', 'Internet Safety', 'Sex and the law', 'Peer pressure'
- Supporting young people to access other services/agencies as appropriate

What is Child Sexual Exploitation?

"Child sexual exploitation is a form of sexual abuse in which a child or young person is exploited, coerced and/or manipulated into engaging in some form of sexual activity in return for something they need or desire and/or for the gain of a third person.

The 'something' received by the child can include both tangible items such as food, somewhere to stay, drugs, alcohol, cigarettes or money and more intangible 'rewards' such as perceived affection, protection or a sense of belonging. Fear of what might happen if they do not comply can also be a significant influencing factor.

Common to all these scenarios is an imbalance of power in favour of the abuser and some degree of coercion, intimidation, exploitation, violence and/or enticement of the child or young person." (DSCF 2009)

The abuse can be perpetrated by groups or individuals, and by adults or peers.
